# 2012 H.I.P. (HISTORY IN PROGRESS) SUMMER CAMP FOR KIDS!!

This past August, the LP-NEHS held our first annual H.I.P. summer program for local youth. 11 kids from grades 3-6 spent a week with camp facilitator and Lake Placid Elementary School teacher Tom Dodd, historical society trustee Dean Dietrich, and Director Jenn Tufano researching and producing a historically-based project. Each camper selected a topic and, using online search engines coupled with physical historical society objects, produced a final poster which remained on exhibit at The History Museum throughout the month of August.

Projects ranged from hockey and dogsledding to the Lady of the Lake and the naming of Mirror Lake. Two students even donned historical clothing and by using museum props developed three skits! These skits were video taped and displayed on our touch screen museum kiosk. Funding from the LPEF, Lake Placid Kiwanis Club and the Arts Council of the Northern Adirondacks helped defray the 2012 camp expenses.

The Barry Collection of glass plate negatives, once housed at the Lake Placid Club, are images taken mostly by a gentleman by the name of Chester D. Moses. It appears that Moses came to Lake Placid around 1898 and was hired as the official Lake Placid Club photographer to support his medical studies. His step-father, Professor Cleaves, was an apartment and Photo and Art Shop owner on Main Street where Moses displayed and sold his photographs. It is not known how the extensive collection of slides ended up with the Irving L. Stedman files. However, Mr. Stedman was also an official photo-



-grapher of the Lake Placid Club for many years, and it is assumed by 1910 Dr. Moses established his medical practice and turned all his slides over to Stedman.

During the 1930s, the Lake Placid Club hired a young Jim Barry as an assistant to Stedman. Barry worked with Mr. Stedman until his demise in 1960. At that time all the files were housed in different storage areas at the Club until 1981 when the Lake Placid Center for Music, Drama & Art (now the LPCA) became the owners. The Historical Society purchased the collection in 2011.

These three gentlemen are only a small part of the hundreds of photographers who moved into the Adirondacks to capture its beauty. The first photo shop on Main Street, which was a tumble-down looking building in the area of the present Mid's Park, was owned by Mr. James Brownell. In the early 1900s Henry Kaiser, a travelling salesman of photo supplies, fell in love with the area while selling photo supplies and convinced Mr. Brownell to give him a job. He would work without pay until he doubled the store's business; at that point he would receive 50% of the profits. This agreement proved successful, and within a year Mr. Kaiser had tripled the profits and bought the business from Brownell. Kaiser became world known not only for his pictures but for his business endeavors.

Postcards became very popular in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century and Henry M. Beach was one of the most famous producers. His everyday captures of Northern New York life were very popular with tourists and residents alike. Other photographers were better known for their portraits. Two well known were William Cheeseman and Grover Cleveland. Seneca Ray Stoddard, G.T. Rabideau, William K. Kollecher, and Henry Kloss were known for their outstanding camping and outdoor life pictures. Later came the outstanding shots by Frank Houck, David and Katherine Jones, and Nathan Farb. The list is too long to iterate.

Because of these talented men and women our beautiful mountains, outstanding sports events, and captivating people will always be part of the North Country history.
