F EATURE **A**RTICLE-Forces Fueling the Golden Age of Hotels

Crowded cities, infection and lack of air conditioning made the cool air of the Adirondacks appealing to those that could afford the journey, but other forces were at work to make Lake Placid a tourist destination. Improvements in transportation kept strengthening this corridor: completion in 1846 of the stage-coach from Canada to Albany with connection to Lake Placid, improved rail services, Henry Ford's Model T, in the early 1900s and finally The Adirondack Northway in the 1950s.


In 1885, the NY Forest Preserve and the Adirondack Park was formed. Governors Theodore Roosevelt at the turn of the century to Nelson Rockefeller in the 1960s initiated conservation movements which increased interest in the "wilds." Melville Dewey's Lake Placid Club started winter sports in the area in the early 1900s making it a year round destination.

But perhaps is was the romantic vision of artists that lured the most people to the Adirondacks. James Fenimore Cooper wrote the series "Leatherstocking Tales" and William H. H. Murray wrote "Adventures in the Wilderness; or, Camp-Life in the Adirondacks". Who could resist the visions of photographer Seneca Ray Stoddard and his book "The Adirondacks: Illustrated"? The second generation of artists in The Hudson River School, including Frederick Church and John Kenesett, brought our glorious landscapes to the Metropolitan Museum of Art and other venues in NYC and beyond. Is it any wonder that the rush was on to see and experience the Adirondacks?

F LASH BACK

200 years ago.....Spain is having a bad year with Columbia, Argentina and Chile declaring independence, Seville is surrendered to the French, Mexico begins its revolt and the U.S annexes Western Florida; mean-while Japan invades Korea, and the composer Frederick Chopin is born.

Vitamin B, teeth braces and neon signs made their debut while credit cards still didn't exist.



The beginning of the hotel business In Lake Placid...

The first residence, in what was to become the Village of Lake Placid, that was enlarged enough to become accommodations for tourists, was "Nash's Red House" in 1852. By 1864 more tourists were arriving and Martin Lyon opened his "Lyon's Inn" or the "North Elba House" on Old Military Road. Robert Scott also expanded his farmhouse on Cascade Road and opened what was known as, "Mountain View House".

In 1871, the first "hotel" to accept guests was first called "Brewster's" but after years of reconstruction became known as "Lake Placid Inn" and "Lake Placid House". A little known hotel was built on River Road in 1869 known as 'Hammer's Hotel". Joseph Nash in 1876 built another hotel on Signal Hill and called it "Excelsior House". John Stevens purchased the building in 1878 and renamed it "Stevens House". Moses Ferguson bought property from Joe Nash and in 1878 erected a building that was to become the "Grand View Hotel". Down the slope Henry Allen built the "Allen House" in 1880 and three years later the "Mirror Lake House" appeared.

Lake Placid Lake saw the erection of a three story log cabin house of public accommodations owned by the Leggetts and known as "Castle Rustico" in 1879. "The Westside" also on Lake Placid Lake opened in 1882 but was later torn down and rebuilt as the "Whiteface Inn". The East side of Lake Placid Lake saw the "Ruisseaumont" take its place among the hotels in 1892. The Hurley Brothers built the "American House" in 1893 on the Mill Pond. In 1897 Wes Kennedy opened "Northwoods Inn" on land overlooking Mirror Lake on the west side of Main Street. Later to become the "Hotel Marcy" in 1926.

Closing out the 1800's, "the golden age of hotels", the hotel "St. Moritz" was opened in 1900 by Albert and Etta Littlejohn Stickney.



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
