NEW YEAR-ROUND HISTORICAL SOCIETY OFFICE LOCATED IN THE LPCA ANNEX

For decades, after Columbus Day weekend, the LP-NEHS would close our beloved History Museum on Station Street and conduct off-season business either from a home office or other borrowed space. As off-season programs, activities, and donations have grown in recent years, securing a year-round office space became essential. We are pleased to share that this fall the need became a reality.

Back in May, the boards of the Lake Placid Center for the Arts and the LP-NEHS held discussions about renovating and renting a portion of the Annex building for Historical Society business. James Lemons, LPCA Executive Director, was supportive of the project from the beginning and helped move the work along.

Thanks to support from the Lake Placid Education Foundation and Uihlein Foundation, the Historical Society now enjoys a functional and efficient space to conduct business with a five-year lease.

Complete with a 1970s vibe, the rented space holds both a large office space facing Saranac Avenue and a second room which will hold an exhibit with collections still to be determined. What is truly ideal about the space and location is its proximity to the glass plate negatives that are still in storage in the LPCA crawl space. Because of some exciting new grant funding (see below) getting to these glass plates easily will help expedite our preservation work on this historic collection.

This year the LP-NEHS became the recipient of two grants to help us clean, protect, organize, and digitize our collection of glass plate negatives. The Northern New York Library Network (NNYLN) awarded funds to purchase archival supplies (acid free envelopes and storage boxes) and digitize each glass plate negative in the collection. The NYS Archives Documentary Heritage Program Arrangement and Description project award also allows for the purchase of archival supplies (we need lots) but the end result will be a physical and digital finding aid which will help researchers and the public find where an individual glass plate is located in storage (which shelving unit, shelf, and box). We are grateful these funding partners recognized the value of this collection and chose to support this important preservation work.

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2013 was an eventful year for your Historical Society and The History Museum!

As you will read elsewhere in the newsletter, due to generous grants from the Lake Placid Education Foundation and Uihlein Foundation we have moved into year round office space with adjacent exhibit area in the Annex at the Lake Placid Center for the Arts. Having a highly visible location throughout the year is a big step for us and will allow Administrative Director and Registrar Jenn Tufano to maximize her efforts in moving the Historical Society forward. Please stop in to say hello to Jenn and see this beautiful new space.

As a result of completing the Cornerstone Project, the three year effort to accession and digitize our entire collection, we now have opportunities for research and public access we have never before been able to offer. We are also more properly storing the collections than ever before and have run out of space in The History Museum and Freight House. Our long term goal is to create more space for collections care, along with year round office and community space, on our "campus" at The History Museum. To that end we have created a group that is currently looking at alternatives and we plan to engage you, our members, in creating a master plan for our needs.

It is clear that the ability to continue our current operations and expand programming in the future is totally dependent on the support of our membership and other organizations which support our efforts. H.I.P. (History in Progress) camp for kids



EV'S BITS... A report from the Town Historian, Beverley P. Reid

Another winter is now upon us and reminded me of a story that Mary MacKenzie, Historian, wrote for the LAKE PLACID NEWS in September 1975 entitled: "Kings of the Road: A 144-Year Pratt Tradition". In the article she wrote how William E. Pratt was elected Superintendent of Highways for the Town of North Elba in 1887 and continued in that position for many years. In 1909, his son, William D. Pratt, held the position until his death in 1923. At that time William E.'s grandson, Gordon L., took over the reins and was re-elected until his retirement in 1972.

During these years Gordon's brothers, Horace Sr., Raymond, William and Cecil were also employed as drivers, mechanics, night watchmen, etc. Many harrowing stories have been related from them regarding the blinding snow storms, snow banks as high as the telephone lines, broken down machinery etc.

However, the Pratt story didn't end with Gordon's retirement. At the time of Gordon's retirement, his nephew, Kent, had already notched twenty years with the town and had decided to run in the next election for Superintendent, which he handily won. Kent continued until his retirement in December 1997 just a few years short of Mary's prediction.

One can only imagine the changes made in the roads from 1898 until 2013. First from serving a population of a couple of hundred to thousands; from horse and buggy to cars and eighteen wheelers; from rutty dirt to brick to macadam; from simple one lane (with necessary turn offs along the way) to two lanes; and through areas that once were never meant for roads to go. Machinery improved from simple wooden rollers pulled behind horses to huge tandem plows. I am sure more than William E. could ever have imagined what changes the future held back in 1887.

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
