TABLELANDS FARM

Tablelands Farm was built on the Plains of Abraham, the site of the earliest settlement of Lake Placid. The first farmhouse was a log cabin. By 1906, when the Lake Placid Club bought the farm, the main building had grown to 14 rooms with indoor plumbing. The barns were also very modern with concrete floors and running water. At that time Tablelands was home to 80 Ayrshire dairy cows.

Located on part of Tablelands Farm was Artesia the creamery, a two story shingle building with concrete floors. The creamery also had an ice house, a wood shed and 3 rooms on the second floor. Built over a 160 foot deep artesian well the water temperature remained a constant 36 degrees, the coldest in the area. The delivery wagon on display belonged to this era. The farm was one of a string of farms purchased to supply the dining rooms of the Lake Placid Club. The four farms were Ridge, Uplands, Pointed Firs and finally Tablelands stretched out along the present day Bear Cub Road. Tablelands provided the Lake Placid Club with dairy products, poultry, beef, and fresh produce, including potatoes.

In 1949, Henry and Mildred Uihlein purchased the farm from the Lake Placid Club to add to their Heaven Hill estate. In 1961 they donated the land to Cornell University to establish a research potato seed farm. This research center was well known in New York state, producing seed potatoes on the amazingly fertile fields of Heaven Hill for farmers nationwide. In June of 2020, Cornell University will be closing the farm. There are no known current plans for the property.




PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

BEV'S BITS— WE LIVE BY SIGNS

A report from the Town Historian, Beverley P. Reid

We live by signs: ON/OFF; RED/STOP; GREEN/GO

Where are we going? To Price Chopper. On the way we stop at United States Post Office, Lake Placid Public Library, Kinney's. We purchase Nabisco, General Mills, Hershey's.

Signs are a history in themselves. Pick a building on Main Street and study the names it has presented in the past. For example, the Masonic Building, known as 103-105 Main Street, now 2511 Main Street was built in 1916 to house the Masonic events on the second floor. The other two floors were occupied over the years by Barber Shop, The Knit Shop, Barry and Wilson Printing, Bowling Alley, Teenage Center, and Antique Store—just to name a few. If we did not have signs, we would not know what to do, where to go, what to buy, etc. Thank you sign makers!

NEW MUSEUM EXHIBIT

View our new exhibit, *Sign/Design*, now on display at The History Museum! Travel back in time and learn about the artistry and evolution of sign making in Lake Placid. This exhibit will be on display through fall 2021. The History Museum is open Thursday through Sunday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Face masks are required to enter, and the capacity will be limited to 15 people at a time. Admission costs \$5 for adults, \$2 for students and seniors, and free for members and children under 12 years old.

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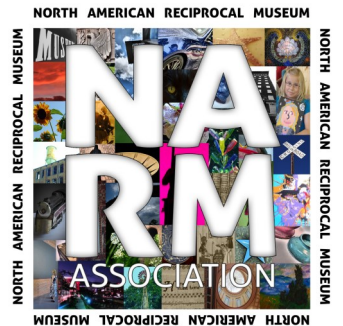
